ADVANCED SPANISH GRAMMAR

This course is designed as a review of some of the more difficult grammatical structures in Spanish. It will be helpful for students who have completed the intermediate level and are planning to go on to take upper-level classes in Spanish. While there is some oral work, the focus is on written work.

Objectives :

- review grammatical structures learned in beginning & intermediate Spanish
- fine-tune difficult grammatical concepts
- establish more idiomatic, native-like structures
- practice reading, writing, listening, and speaking Spanish
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Outcomes : will depend on the Units completed by the student. Outcomes are clearly stated for each unit.

The student will take an assessment test at the beginning of the course. This test will determine in what areas each student is already strong and in what areas each student needs more practice. Based on the results of the assessment test, the student will be assigned 5 units (of the possible 9) that she or he needs to complete. The assessment test should reflect your true abilities: there is no benefit in trying to do either better or worse on the test, as each student will complete the same number of assignments.

Course Structure:

Pre-assessment test will determine which 5 units the student will complete.

- I. VERBS: Present/Past
- II. VERBS: other forms- Future/ Conditional/ Ser, Estar, Haber
- III. VERBS: other forms- Perfect/ Progressive
- IV. VERBS: Indicative/ Subjunctive/ Commands
- V. VERBS: continuation of Indicative/ Subjunctive
- VI. PREPOSITIONS
- VII. PROUNOUNS
- VIII. ARTICLES, ADJECTIVES, SENTENCE STRUCTURE
- IX. COMMON PROBLEMS & FINE TUNING: Passive voice/ Time expressions/ Comparisons

Each unit includes the following activities or lessons:

- introduction
- readings and activities from textbook
- auto-graded activities from CD-ROM
- writing assignment
- oral assignment (role-play, situations, Q & A)
- final quiz

Week 1: Complete assessment test and receive individualized course plan.

- Guidelines for how to make accent marks and such are with your assignments. The CD-ROM has special buttons you will need to use for that purpose. Accent marks are important: tomo and tomó are different words, and if you get the accent wrong, the word is wrong.
- Homework assignments will not be graded on the percentage that you got right, but on the level of effort- complete assignments that reflect thought and effort will get an A; almost complete a B; missing more than one exercise or careless in other ways a C; missing a significant portion a D. Oral activities will not be graded- you will either receive credit or you won't. If you follow the instructions, speak only in Spanish, show evidence of having studied the grammatical structures, and fulfill the time requirement, you will get credit.
- Writing assignments will be corrected and assigned a letter grade.
