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Application Process

Your exchange application begins with the help of your coordinator, who completes a nomination form on your behalf. Once UAF receives your nomination, the Incoming Exchange Coordinator will contact you directly with guidance on sending us your required application materials, below.

All required items must be in English and emailed to rkmenzia@alaska.edu.

Required application items include:

1. UAF Exchange Application Form
2. Financial Verification Form and proof of funding for duration of program
 - a. Exchange students must show documented proof of funding
3. Home University Transcript
4. Copy of passport information page
5. English Proficiency Documentation

Tuition and Fees for Students

Tuition Waiver Students

Students attending on an approved tuition waiver will not be charged tuition or general university fees. They are responsible for course materials, housing and meal plan costs, which typically range from \$6,000–\$7,500 per semester, depending on selections.

Tuition-Paying Students

Students without a tuition waiver are billed at the non-resident tuition rate. However, students from a UA sister city qualify for the resident tuition rate.

Tuition & Fee Estimates

Tuition and fees depend on both the number of credits and the specific types of courses selected. Please note that some charges – such as special course or department fees – may not appear in the calculator.

Housing & Meals

Arrival and Departure Information

When to Arrive	We recommend you arrive at least a day before the residence halls open. Students can arrive in the U.S. up to 30 days in advance. If you would like arrive early please apply for an early move-in date with residence life. Students are required to arrive in Fairbanks to attend the international new student orientation.
How to Get to Campus	The nearest airport is Fairbanks International Airport (FAI). Students can take a cab, an Uber/Lyft, or a city bus to campus. Cab fare is approximately \$20; a single ride on the bus is \$1.50. UAF may offer airport pickup service during the start of orientation in the fall.
End of Program	Students should plan to stay until the last day of finals listed on the Academic Calendar. Students have 30 days in which they can stay in the U.S. after their program end date listed on their DS-2019, which is the last day of finals for their final semester.
Can I Extend?	Yes, you may extend your visa for study or practical experience with approval from our office. See the visa section below.

How to Apply for your Visa	Once your application for study has been approved by UAF, the DS-2019 Certificate of Eligibility for Exchange Visitors (J visa) Status will be prepared. International Student and Scholars Services Office staff will email this document to your alaska.edu account, along with other information, to your home university coordinator, usually by mid-June (though sometimes it can take longer). Once you receive the DS-2019, you can pay your SEVIS fee and arrange your visa interview.
Visa Extensions	Students can extend their visa for an Academic Training opportunity (employment, internship, research, or other practical experience related to your field of study as reflected on your DS-2019). Extension paperwork must be submitted one month prior to your DS-2019 end date.
Insurance	All international students (Non-U.S. citizens) are required to purchase a UAF-recommended health insurance plan costing approximately \$600-\$900 per semester. International students that hold U.S. citizenship are not eligible to purchase the UAF health plan. They are encouraged to obtain their own insurance plan before arrival if they need coverage.

Course Information

Language of Instruction	All courses are conducted in English, except for foreign language courses.
Minimum Language Requirements	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • To take regular UAF classes, students must have a minimum 70 on the TOEFL iBT. • Students who have a TOEFL iBT score of 65-69 are required to take one English intensive course. • Students with a TOEFL-iBT score of 46-64 are required to take 12 credits in the English intensive program. Students must have a score of at least 46 to attend UAF. • If your university uses a different proficiency scale, let us know and we can convert the requirements.
Minimum Credits	<p>Undergraduate: 12 in-person credits per semester</p> <p>Graduate: 9 in-person credits at the 400- and 600-level per semester</p>
Restricted Courses	<p>The following courses for credit do not count towards the minimum requirement:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Distance Courses (including courses that meet at a specific time) • Research/Thesis/Non-thesis Research Projects • Directed/Independent Study • Private Lessons • Internships <p><i>There may be additional courses that do not count towards the minimum credit requirement that are not listed above.</i></p> <p>Internship, Research, and Thesis courses must be arranged in advance of registration. These are not pre-arranged opportunities; the student and faculty must design the course requirements together. This is extremely difficult to do before arrival to Fairbanks. We suggest students interested in these types of opportunities stay for a full year and make arrangements for these activities for their second semester.</p>

Some courses listed might not be offered in Fairbanks.</p> <p>Course Search: https://alaska.search.collegescheduler.com/</p> <p>This link can be used to search for courses offered by every UA campus all over the state of Alaska. Students must take in-person UAF courses within the city of Fairbanks. When searching for courses, students must be sure to select "UAF – Fairbanks Campus" as the campus.</p> <p>Once students have fulfilled their 9 (graduate) or 12 (undergraduate) in-person credit requirement they can search other UAF campuses for distance courses to take in addition. Students cannot take classes at the other University of Alaska schools (UAA and UAS), even by distance.</p>

Selecting a Field of Study

Program Objective Requirement

At the time of application, students are required to select a “Program Objective” (major/field of study) that they wish to study at UAF. The program objective can be related to their home degree, or it can be entirely different. This program welcomes all students, regardless of the their home degree area of study.

The J-1 student visa requires 9 credits of the student’s required 12 in-person semester credits must be related to the program objective.

Example course selection related to a program objective: For students choosing biological sciences, related classes could include a geological sciences course (GEOS), statistics (STAT), wildlife biology and conservation (WLF), or any other course that is related to the program objective, even if it is not in the BIOL subject search.

Once a student has at least 9 credits of their course load related to their program objective, courses in any area may be chosen, however course prerequisites may need to be met.
