

## Tales on the Tundra

We are very excited to be partnering with the Southwest Alaska Arts Group and KYUK to do another Tales on the Tundra event on September 21. Tales on the Tundra is an annual storytelling event modeled after the popular Anchorage based Arctic Entries shows. For the third year in a row, seven community members will take the stage to tell a seven minute story about their own lives. Stories range from funny to sad and from scary to romantic. Local band PNKS with Paul Basile, Nate DeHaan, and Kevin Morgan will perform, and elder Bev Hoffman will host the show.

We are currently recruiting storytellers. All community members are welcome to pitch a theme here. Storytellers will be matched with a coach ahead of time to practice their story, and the week before the event we will have a dress rehearsal. SWAAG and KYUK will work together to record the show, and it will air on the radio and YouTube at a later date. 


## Redwall by Brian **Jacques Book Review**

Redwall is an epic tale of heroism, adventure, and bravery featuring a group of small woodland creatures trying to protect their home. Written by Brian Jacques in 1986, Redwall has fascinated children for nearly forty years. Matthias is a young member of Redwall Abbey, a peaceful order of mice that provide help to all who roam Mossflower Wood. However, when Cluny the Scourge and his evil band of rodents threaten the safety of the Abbey and its inhabitants, Matthias must rise up to defend his home! What begins as mysterious clues to the whereabouts of the famed sword of Martin the Warrior, Redwall's founder, spirals into a momentous quest spanning all of Mossflower Wood where Matthias will encounter a colorful cast of critters and challenges.

lacques's dense and detailed prose transports the reader into Mossflower Wood and Redwall Abbey. The various guirks of the numerous animals are well realized in their mannerisms. ways of speaking, and alliances. The audience not only follows Matthias's journey, but also witnesses Cluny's wicked plans, the heartfelt stories of other abbey members, and the sly dealings of more wicked characters. Jacques deeply fleshes out the history of the land and its people evocative of Tolkien's Lord



of the Rings in its nuance. Although a children's story, this fantasy action adventure maintains an honest dialogue with its violence, and Jacques litters Redwall with engaging themes of virtue, courage, and trust. The immersive world Jacques illustrates continues in an epic saga spanning twenty two novels, many of which can be found within the children's room at the library!
