

Shotgun Postal Match

General Rules

- Alaska 4-H Code of Conduct will be enforced for all shooting sports events.
- Participants must be enrolled in shooting sports.
- Participants have one month to record their scores.
- Participants should have enough time for warm-up, practice, and the round; a rest period if needed.
- No electronic devices other than noise-canceling earmuffs (e.g., cell phones, range finders, iPods) will be permitted on the range.
- Rounds must be shot during the scheduled month and scores must be submitted electronically by the last day of the month. Results will be returned by the 5th of the following month.

Fee

- \$10 per shooter, per discipline.

Shotgun Specific Rules

- Any 12 gauge or smaller shotgun is permitted, in either semi-automatic, pump or break-action (over-under or side-by-side). Shotguns with higher magazine capacities may only contain two (2) shells at any given time.
- Course of fire is the standard American Trap from 16 yards.
- For a target to be considered "dead" it must have a visible piece broken from it, or one that is completely reduced to dust. All other targets will be scored as "lost."
- The ATA Rule Book of the Amateur Trapshooting Association of America will be used.

Class

Junior ages 9-11

Rounds

50 doubles (100 clays, 100 shells) for all age groups

50 singles (50 clays, 50 shells) for all age groups

Scoring

Singles, it has to break the clay to count.

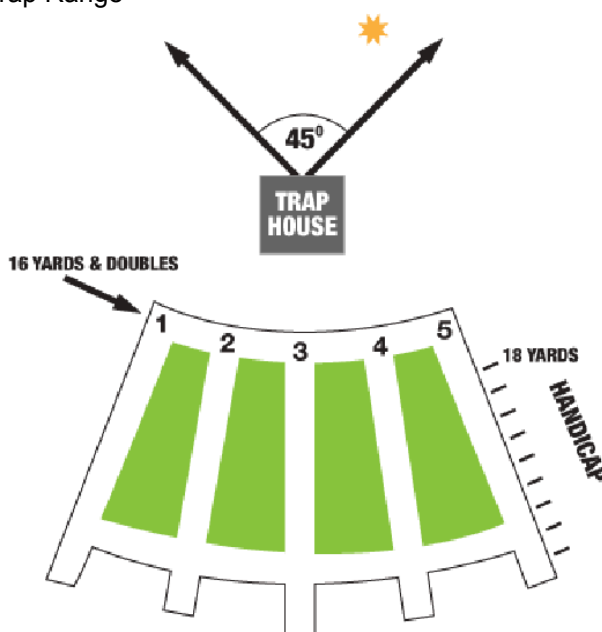
Doubles, they have to break both clays for it to count.
