Department of Political Science, BA Program: Student Outcomes

Upon receipt of their B.A. in Political Science, students will have acquired:

- 1. Knowledge of core concepts and theories of the main political science sub-fields of American Government and Politics, Public and Constitutional Law, Comparative Politics, Political Theory and International Relations.
- Exposure to different ways of thinking about government and politics associated with diverse historical and cultural contexts, ideologies, economic systems and governing structures.
- 3. Training in written, oral and visual communication, critical thinking and problem solving.
- 4. Familiarity with a range of qualitative and quantitative research methods used to produce, understand and analyze the data used in governance, policy-making and political science scholarship.
- 5. Knowledge gained through experiential learning including participation in extracurricular activities, community organizations or other service-oriented learning.
- 6. Awareness of theories and practices related to contemporary studies of political science including global, national and local environmental issues; political, social and economic development; citizenship and political identities; equity and ethics in political behavior; and conflict and cooperation strategies.
- 7. A capstone experience that either: a) tests ability to understand the political context of current and historic events as well as critically evaluate political concepts and theories in a senior thesis; or b) applies core concepts and theories of political science in a government or non-profit organizational setting.
- 8. Preparation for graduate and professional studies along with the mastery of skills needed to pursue political and policy-related careers in the public, non-governmental and private sectors.
