






Alaska Funding Distribution





Alaska Funding Distribution






Tribal Court Assessment To-Date


2013 - Present

Completed <u>190</u> Tribal Court Assessments <u>54</u> are in-progress






Progress of Tribal Court Assessments






Progress of ALASKA Tribal Court Assessments





Of the 190 completed assessments, <u>70</u> are in Alaska. Of the 54 that are in-progress, <u>30</u> are in Alaska





Why a Tribal Court Assessment?

- The assessment is a tool to assist Tribes and TJS to determine tribal justice resources;
- Identify funding needs to provide expeditious and effective administration of justice;
- The assessment becomes a blueprint for the tribe to improve the administration of justice by focusing on performance, selfassessment and self-improvement;
- Identify areas where the court is performing well and areas that need improvement;



Why a Tribal Court Assessment?

- A tribe can use the assessment as a guide for setting performance targets, monitoring performance, evaluating performance and using the feedback to improve or develop court practices and polices; and
- Can receive one-time funding for tribal courts.
