# **Principles of Homeland Security & Emergency Management**

## **Course Description**

The course provides a foundational perspective as to how our present federal emergency management and homeland security structure emerged with emphasis placed on the characteristics, functions, and resources of its integrated systems. This course additionally focuses on the principles and practices of homeland security and emergency management at the local, state and federal levels

#### **Course Objectives**

Upon completion of the course students should have a firm grasp of homeland security & emergency management processes and issues. Emphasis will be placed on students developing a greater understanding of the complexities of the Department of Homeland Security and the Federal Emergency Management Agency and those skills sets required to integrate the major supporting services (health, fire, law enforcement, Hazmat etc.) Students will leave the course with a strong understanding of the terminology used by emergency managers.

#### **Instructional Method**

The course format includes lecture, class discussions, reading assignments, internet-based Blackboard assignments, guest speakers, and a tabletop/functional EOC exercise (depending upon class size and EOC availability).

Recommended preparation: 2 hours weekly beyond class instruction

Quizzes will account for 10% of the overall grade. (True-False, Fill in the blank, Multiple choice, Short answer)

A Mid Term will account for 25%. (Essay)

Weekly Reviews/Discussion Management 15%. (Students are required to turn in a review of the assigned weekly readings <u>at the beginning of each class</u>. The review is to be two pages (typed), font 11—double spaced. Additionally, students will be prepared to lead discussions/contribute to the lecture.

Blackboard will be used to cover special topic and case study presentations (10%) for use during the course. Each student team will be responsible for developing their own special topic, soliciting input from other students via Blackboard (interest in the topic, relevance to the course etc.), and for the development of a 15 minute presentation via power point or other suitable delivery tool.

A Group Project consisting of both a table top exercise and a functional exercise will constitute 15% of the class.

A Final will account for the remaining 25% of the overall grade. (Essay)
