Course Description:

This course introduces the roles and responsibilities of a firing boss (FIRB), common firing devices, and general firing operations and techniques. The course provides students with important information concerning general tasks required to be successful. This course is based on a National Wildfire Coordinating Group (NWCG) course.

Offered Spring Even-numbered Years

Course Goals:

Successful course completion combined with national age, physical fitness and appropriate experience requirements as administered by a federal or state wildland fire agency will qualify the student for interagency fire qualification certifications.

Prerequisites:

FIRE 155, or instructor's permission

Student Learning Outcomes:

The successful student will be able to:

Describe the roles and responsibilities of the FIRB for planning, execution, safety, and coordination of an ignition operation on a wildland or prescribed fire.

Describe the specialized firing devices, their characteristics, applications, safety and transportation requirements, maintenance needs and availability.

Prepare a briefing that contains desired fire behavior, firing techniques, necessary resources, and risk management to meet wildland or prescribed fire objectives; emphasize safety, coordination, communication, and evaluation.

Methods:

The course is interactive lecture with visuals. Group discussion is strongly encouraged. Lectures will be aided by demonstrations, and exercises. Homework assignments, periodic quizzes and examinations will document student progress.

Instructor Qualifications:

Lead instructor must be a NWCG qualified firing boss, single resource. Unit instructors must be NWCG qualified as any single resource boss.
