The Journalism Department recognizes that specialization is no longer benefiting our graduates in the workplace. In the proposed single curriculum, all Journalism majors will receive broad training in a range of reporting skills and more rigorous coaching in medium-specific writing conventions. The change will eliminate current concentrations in Broadcast journalism, New Media, News-Editorial, and Photojournalism and revive Public Relations (now titled Public Relations Techniques) as a required course.

The proposed revisions bring UAF Journalism's curriculum in line with industry workforce expectations and promote greater efficiency within the department through the elimination of four specialty concentrations. Existing facilities and equipment are sufficient to serve our majors. Nothing changes with respect to the department's request to fill an existing broadcast faculty vacancy.

Journalism is the department directly affected. We do not anticipate any reduction in our ability to support cross-listed classes, including those serving Theatre's film major.

F. IF MAJOR CHANGE - ASSESSMENT OF THE PROGRAM:

Description of the student learning outcomes assessment process.)

Journalism employs two main methods of outcome assessment: Overall skills of our majors are tracked through interviews and survey data collected from JRN 400 Professional Media Internship newsroom supervisors. In January 2010, the department began monitoring learning outcomes for select JRN courses with the help of external reviewers, who compare pre-semester and post-semester mastery of course objectives. We conduct such external reviews on two to four classes each semester. Eliminating the specialty tracks should provide a larger pool of majors following the same sequence of classes, enhancing the department's ongoing efforts tracking the effectiveness of our curriculum.

Online information delivery is transforming news and public communications. Traditional distinctions separating print journalists from broadcast counterparts are swiftly eroding. Reporters today routinely cover, write, shoot and package their stories for an array of media. The collapse of business models supporting traditional newspapers and, to a lesser extent, news stations, is propelling many journalists to seek jobs in corporate communications and other related professions.

As a consequence, UAF Journalism Department finds that the specialization available through our four concentration paths—broadcast, news-editorial (print), new media and photojournalism—no longer benefits our graduates. Employers bluntly tell us they prefer the generalist able and willing to report through print, video and the web over applicants who might be more polished in a single medium. The proposed single curriculum ensures all Journalism majors will receive broad training in a range of reporting skills, as well as more rigorous coaching in medium-specific writing conventions. Public Relations, a former specialty concentration, is reintroduced as a required class for the major, another step preparing our students for a changing marketplace.

Our small department has changed to suit an evolving profession before. UAF Journalism received accolades from accreditation reviewers and others for instituting JRN 490 Online Publication, a required capstone class that first applied to seniors graduating in 2007. Since that time, faculty have steadily broadened content in many classes, promoting cross-training within News Editorial, Broadcast, Photojournalism and New Media concentrations.

Half steps are no longer adequate to ensure all majors possess the versatility expected by employers. The proposed curriculum changes are the product of years of discussion, faculty review of journalism instruction at other institutions and feedback from employers.

This plan reflects our faculty consensus on how to best teach journalism today. It embodies the mission statement faculty adopted in 2004-05, following the renaming of our department from Journalism and Broadcasting to simply UAF Journalism:

Our mission is to prepare versatile journalists who are ably suited to enhance the profession in Alaska and elsewhere.

The Department is committed to the development of professional skills, critical thinking and journalistic ethics.
