Additionally, we are no longer offering a minor in Gerontology and we no longer have the Title IV-E entitlement grant. We are adding an elective course to the list of elective courses—it has just never been added. The minimum credits required for the degree reduced from 123 to 120, and finally adding "0" credits to Practicum 466 (since not all students need to take this course.)
