### F. IF MAJOR CHANGE - ASSESSMENT OF THE PROGRAM:

Description of the student learning outcomes assessment process.)

The student learning outcome for BA majors that this change impacts is "a basic understanding of the history of the discipline, including subdisciplinary perspectives and approaches to the study of culture, society, and human development, ... (3) and understanding of cultural and linguistic diversity and the implications of cultural difference for understanding the human condition." At present, no required course represents the linguistic anthropology subdiscipline or addresses (3). Requiring students to take a linguistic anthropology-specific course will help the department meet its learning outcomes.

The department is reviewing and revising SLOA, but the plan is that student knowledge of subdisciplines, including linguistic anthropology, will be in part assessed through an exit interview for majors and minors.

### JUSTIFICATION FOR ACTION REQUESTED

The purpose of the department and campus-wide curriculum committees is to scrutinize program/degree change applications to make sure that the quality of UAF education is not lowered as a result of the proposed change. At present, course content that includes detailed study of linguistic anthropology and anthropological and social approaches to language are not part of the core requirements for the major. LING 101, "The Nature of Language" is a broad survey course of the subfields of linguistics and it does not provide an in depth of exposure to linguistic anthropology (one of the four subfields of anthropology), which was part of the original intent of requiring a linguistics course for majors (as there was a long period without a tenure track linguistic anthropologist on the faculty). Furthermore, all of the other specific course requirements are for courses offered in the anthropology department are taught by anthropology faculty, unlike LING F101, creating a disparity in representation of the linguistic anthropology subfield. Given that a 200-level course that fulfills the four-field learning outcome is now offered in the Anthropology Department, the curriculum should reflect this.
