Course Description

This course is designed to introduce students to the art of expedition tripping with inflatable kayaks. We will float down Birch Creek as it flows out of the White Mountains and heads down towards the Yukon. This float is 126 miles of mostly Class I and II water with one Class III section that can be run or portaged. Birch Creek is a National Wild and Scenic River which starts as a quick narrow stream and becomes slow meandering river as it heads towards the Yukon flats. The students will be involved with all aspects of planning and executing this awesome wilderness trip. Food and transportation is included in the field fee.

Course Goals

After this course students should have a good understanding of the planning and execution of a wilderness float trip in Alaska. Students will become proficient in different aspects of paddling loaded inflatable kayaks including; avoiding obstacles, reading water, scouting rapids, boat maintenance, and efficient paddle strokes. Students will also learn about; camp selection, navigation, bear safety, leave no trace ethics and food choices and preparation in the wilderness.

Appropriate Student Background

There are no prerequisites for this course; however, enrollees must be in adequate physical condition to paddle a kayak 5-9 hours a day, and to carry their gear and boats for short distances. Students must be willing to; travel in inclement weather, have wet feet, drag their boats through shallow water, deal with lots of bugs, and travel through river rapids of up to Class II.

Equipment

Outdoor Adventures will provide: boats, paddles, dry suits, neoprene gloves, neoprene boots, dry bags, tents, sleeping bags, sleeping pads, stoves, and pots. Students will need to have clothing that is appropriate for being outside in the Arctic in late July.

Grading

This is a pass/fail course.

Course Material

There is no text book. Each Student will need to have a field notebook and pencil for the course.

Course Assignments

Students will be expected use the notebook to create a future reference for backcountry float travel. This should include: Notes about gear, notes about food choices including likes/dislikes and amounts, daily distances and times, route hints, general reminder notes, and reflections about the trip (I.E. why you are there?) This notebook can also contain references and helpful hints such as navigation reminders

Risk Tolerance

Due to the nature of outdoor travel there are certain inherent risks in this class. Acceptable risks include but are not limited too; river currents, waves and hydraulics, natural and manmade obstacles in the river, sweepers, logjams, high and low water, and getting wet while on the trip. We will wear PFD's at all times on the river and drysuits and helmets when appropriate. Conditions may include below freezing temperatures, thunderstorms, rain, sleet and high winds. Driving risks may include slick roads, poor visibility and wildlife. Alaska is a wild place - you need to take ultimate responsibility for your own safety as only you can
