The purpose of the department and campus-wide curriculum committees is to scrutinize course change and new course applications to make sure that the quality of UAF education is not lowered as a result of the proposed change. The addition of MUS F476 Senior project to the BA degree is, in part, a response to the Department's recent BA Program Review, which noted the absence of clear student learning outcomes and assessments within the BA.

Furthermore, the addition of a senior project provides greater diversity and flexibility within the BA degree, as students will have the opportunity to develop their own unique project in areas of research, composition, performance, and possibly interdisciplinary study.

Finally, students will have prepared a substantive project that may be presented through a variety of forums such as URSA Research Showcase, lecture-recital, concert event, undergraduate journals, conferences or other publications.

The quality of UAF education will only be enhanced by the expanded opportunities available to music students through a senior project to the BA program.

Hi Bill

Thanks for sharing this information. One thing I would like for your faculty to consider with this course, is whether or not you will ask students to deposit a copy of their final project in UA ScholarWorks. This is our institutional repository, into which all graduate theses are now deposited, as well as most departmental publications, all university publications, and some faculty are also putting copies of published research papers (if they have retained their copyright to do so). Obviously at this time there is no university requirement for undergraduate students to deposit anything, and if the department chooses this as a requirement for their own students, they need to get the students' permission to share the work publicly (FERPA). Ideally, it will be a comprehensive online library for any significant work done at UA.

As far as library resources go with regard to the capstone, please just keep telling all your students to make requests for new materials; these requests help tremendously in ensuring a high quality collection. We no longer have the budget to buy lots of materials "just in case" as we used to do, so it's an item-by-item selection process. We need as much input from departments as possible in order to ensure strong research collections. Here is a link to our resource recommendation form, for any format of material:

I'd also like to remind faculty to use our instruction program as needed; we can work with a small group of grad

3 credits As Demand Warrants

Preparation and presentation of a senior project based on a topic of the student's choosing in consultation with the instructor. Project may take the form of a research paper, original music composition, music performance as lecture-recital, or some combination of these as appropriate to the topic. Prerequisites: Senior standing and permission of the instructor. (1+0+2)

Course Goals and Learning Outcomes:

At the successful completion of this course, you will be able to:

- -focus and develop the topic, scope and content of a large-scale project involving written and oral presentation
- -conduct productive research and work independently in scholarly and creative activities
- -utilize advanced skills and knowledge attained in theoretical, historical and applied music studies as appropriate to the project topic and presentation
- -present the completed project in a public or scholastic venue through written and/or performance media, as appropriate to the topic

Instructional Methods:

MUS F476 is a course of supervised scholarly activity. Your instructor will meet with you one hour weekly to advise you on your project topic, research and creative activities.
