#### F. IF MAJOR CHANGE - ASSESSMENT OF THE PROGRAM:

Program assessment within the LING BA focuses on faculty evaluation of student presentations and written papers in upper division courses, most significantly 482 Seminar, our capstone course.

Other program assessment includes, a written survey prior to graduation.

While it is not formal part of our program assessment, the LING program has also implemented a new advising system. This system maintains online advising records, summarizing all individual advising sessions and advising emails between advisor and advisee. These records are open to all program faculty so that a student may meet with any advisor within the program when/if their assigned advisor is not available. In addition, the program chair reviews all advising records prior to course enrollment periods to help guide the faculty in successful advising toward degree completion. This new advising scheme has had good results as we expect to see threefold increase in graduations this spring.

 Simplifying the list of electives will simplify advising and student self-assessment of degree completion.

As it stands, the catalog provides a laundry list of possible electives for LING majors. This laundry list approach will be replaced with an explicit statement allowing all LING designated courses (including cross-listed courses) to count as electives. All non-cross listed courses currently allowed as

electives for the major will continue to be listed explicitly in the catalog.

2. Limiting the number of lower division electives will explicitly allow what is currently done by petition.

As it stands, there is no explicit statement regarding the number of upper/lower division courses that may be counted as electives. The laundry list currently include only one lower division course (ANL 251). In addition, the LING program offers only 3 lower division courses (LING 100, LING 216, LING 223) that are not explicitly required for the degree (i.e., LING 101 is required for all majors). None of these are currently listed in the laundry list of electives. Thus, it is common for students to petition one or another of these lower division LING courses for the degree.

3. Allowing language credit to the broadest possible application within the degree will shorten time to

degree completion while meeting the explicit and implicit goals of language credit.

Current LING graduates average approximately 160 credits, significantly more than the average BA at UAF. Allowing Foreign Language credit to have the broadest possible application, could bring this average down to between 146 and 136 credits.

LING students must take 36 courses within the major (this includes LING courses as well as allowable electives from other departments). In addition, they are required to take two foreign languages. Specifically, they must take a minimum of 2 years of their first foreign language, and a minimum of 1 year of their second foreign language (12-16 credits in total). This potentially raises credit requirements to 48-54 credits within the major.

From the LING programs point of view, the purpose of the language requirement is to guarantee that students are familiar with a fairly broad range of linguistic structures to be used as data within the field. The purpose is not credit production, but knowledge base.

In addition, most LING majors minor in a Foreign Language or even seek a second major—raising the total Foreign Language credits to between 25 and 36 credits.

Allowing the broadest possible application of Foreign Language credit, therefore, would meet the knowledge base goal while bringing the credit production more in line with other majors on campus.
