Course Description:

Exploration and application of the elements of design as they relate to theatre, dance, film, video, and other art forms. Exploring the development of the technician's craft and the current practices involved in the production of the production environment. Students will be offered both a classroom and actual production experience.

Students will be exposed to all areas of theatre and film technology currently in use at the <u>University of Alaska of Fairbanks</u>, as well as receiving an understanding of technologies available in other theatre environments.

Course Goals:

- Through project work and lecture / demonstrations, the student will be introduced to the safe operation of tools currently in use in the UAF scene shop and KUAC TV studio.
- By completing project assignments, the student will begin to develop a technical resume and portfolio.

Student Learning Outcomes:

- Student will be able to analyze a play script (Theatre) or screenplay (Film) with the purpose of developing a design concept for that work (Written Paper)
- Student will learn the basic elements of design (line, shape, color, size) and how they
 apply to the 3D world of performance. Student will design the overall production look for
 scenic and costume elements for a play and film.
