A. CHANGE IN DEGREE REQUIREMENTS: (Brief statement of program/degree changes and objectives)

Delete upper-level "law-related" course, which is currently PS 435 Constitutional Law I: Institutions and Government Powers, or PS 436 Constitutional Law II: Civil Rights and Civil Liberties, or JRN 413 Mass Media Law. No other associate degree program requires a senior level course in its curriculum. Paralegal Studies students have difficulty in registering for the upper level "law related" courses due to lack of class standing and/or lack of prerequisites. Students will meet the constitutional law component of the paralegal degree requirements by completing a new required course, PLS 270 Constitutional Law for Paralegals, the proposal for which is submitted concurrently.

Minimum Requirements for Degree: 61 credits

The paralegal studies program trains students for employment as paralegals to help deliver legal services under the supervision of a practicing lawyer, and provides continuing education and upgrading of skills for paralegals already employed. The program also offers practical law-related topics for UAF students whose main focus is in other areas of study, such as political science and justice.

Paralegals and legal assistants are not authorized to provide direct legal services to the public. However, they are qualified to perform rudimentary legal research and produce drafts of letters, office memoranda, pleadings, contracts, wills and similar documents. Paralegals conduct client and witness interviews, engage in basic fact-finding and investigation, and assist in trial preparation and discovery. At all times they remain cognizant of the ethical

responsibilities owed by the supervising lawyer to clients, other lawyers and the court system.

The paralegal studies program does not train lawyers or legal administrators. The associate degree is approved by the American Bar Association. The minor is not designed to prepare students to work as paralegals and is not approved by the American Bar Association.

This change will have no impact on the Political Science department as only one paralegal student has taken PS F435 or PS F436 in the last seven years.

The Journalism department may experience a slight decrease in enrollment for JRN F413. Approximately 2-3 paralegal students enroll in JRN F413 per year.

The purpose of the department and campus-wide curriculum committees is to scrutinize program/degree change applications to make sure that the quality of UAF education is not lowered as a result of the proposed change. The Associate of Applied Science in Paralegal Studies degree was first approved in 1992. The program was the result of a collaborative effort between the Political Science department and the School of Career and Continuing Education. Course offerings were shared between these two departments. The Political Science department already offered courses covering the judicial process, legal research and constitutional law, which are central to a quality paralegal curriculum. Paralegal faculty in the SCCE designed and offered lower-level, legal specialty courses specifically for paralegals. This approach was beneficial to both departments in the early years of the paralegal studies program.

Over the subsequent decades, the Paralegal Studies Program, now completed housed within CRDC/Community & Technical College, has updated its curriculum to provide substantive, legal specialty courses with an emphasis on practical, hands-on skills for paralegals that meets CTC's mission of workforce development. The paralegal studies department has developed courses covering legal research and the judicial process. The only holdover from the original program is the 400-level "law related" course, which has been satisfied by PS F435, PS F436 or JRN F413. This shift from a collaborative arrangement with the Political Science department to a workforce development focus now necessitates the elimination of the 400-level "law related" course requirement. No other two-year degree curriculum in the UA system has a similar requirement.

The CTC Paralegal Advisory Board has indicated that constitutional law is an integral component of a paralegal's education, but feels the upper-division course requirement is not warranted for associate degree students. The board recommends the remove of the 400-level course and the development of a required, paralegal-specific constitutional law course. The proposed course, PLS F270, will replace the upper division course and will be better suited for an associate degree program with a focus on workforce development. The new course proposal is filed concurrently.
