A. CHANGE IN DEGREE REQUIREMENTS: (Brief statement of program/degree changes and objectives)

We are requesting two changes to our B.S. program. First, under the previous system of Gen Ed courses, we required majors to take ANTH 100X: Individual, Society and Culture as part of their general education requirements. Given the expanded list of courses fulfilling Gen Ed requirements, we would like to amend that requirement, allowing students to take either ANTH 100X or ANTH 101X: Introduction to Anthropology. The classes cover different material but both serve as gateways to future coursework in anthropology.

Under the current major, B.S. students in Anthropology must choose between taking ANTH 215: Fundamentals of Social/Cultural Anthropology, ANTH 320: Language and Culture in Alaska, or ANTH/LING 223: Sociolinguistics. We are requesting to replace the option of taking ANTH/LING 223 with ANTH/LING 260: Language in Culture and Communication. The latter class, newly added to the catalog, provides a more anthropology centered approach to the language and culture interface and is an introduction to the subfield of linguistic anthropology. While there is some overlap between linguistic anthropology and sociolinguistics, the latter is more closely related to linguistics and does not cover classic texts that reflect the origins of the subfield.

D. ESTIMATED IMPACT

WHAT IMPACT, IF ANY, WILL THIS HAVE ON BUDGET, FACILITIES/SPACE, FACULTY, ETC.

Allowing anthropology majors to choose ANTH 100X or ANTH 101X as one of their general education requirements should have no real budgetary impact, as majors will still be required to take an anthropology course as part of their general education requirements. It should also have a minimal impact on facilities/space. Note, however, that ANTH 101X is currently capped at 30 students (as compared to ANTH 100X, which caps at ~200). If demand warrants, we will increase that enrollment cap, which would require teaching in a larger room (the course is currently offered in Bunnell 302). ANTH 101X has been offered every fall for the last three years, so there is already a faculty member covering the course.

There will not be an impact resulting from substituting ANTH/LING 260 for ANTH/LING 223. Both courses will have the same enrollment cap and will not be offered in the same semester. ANTH/LING would switch to As Demand Warrants.

E. IMPACTS ON PROGRAMS/DEPTS:

Allowing anthropology majors to choose ANTH 100X or ANTH 101X as one of their general education requirements will not impact any programs/departments outside of Anthropology.

Replacing ANTH/LING 223 with ANTH/LING 260 will not impact the Linguistics Program. ANTH/LING 223 is an elective, it is not required for the Linguistics major or minor. ANTH/LING 260 will make up for the potential loss of an elective for Linguistics students in years when ANTH/LING 223 is not offered.

F. IF MAJOR CHANGE - ASSESSMENT OF THE PROGRAM:

Description of the student learning outcomes assessment process.)

Change 1: Allowing anthropology majors to choose ANTH 100X or ANTH 101X as one of their general education requirements

One of the SLOs for the BS in Anthropology is that students will have "a basic understanding of the history of the discipline, including sub-disciplinary perspectives and approaches". ANTH 100X serves equally as well as ANTH 100X towards this end, particularly given that it focuses more specifically on all four subfields (where as ANTH A100X is more focused on socio-cultural anthropology). As an introduction to the four primary subfields in Anthropology, ANTH 101X is designed as a gateway course for future work in anthropology, and highlights the diversity of careers that one can pursue with a major in Anthropology.

Change 2: Replacing ANTH/LING 223 with ANTH/LING 260

This change will more adequately meet one of the SLO for the BS in Anthropology, which is to expose students to the four subfields of Anthropology and their historical development. ANTH/LING 260 is more better suited to meeting these objectives because the material covered in the class is traces the historic development of linguistic anthropology as a subfield of anthropology. It addresses historic and contemporary concerns with the relationship between language, cognition and culture as well as language evolution. Furthermore, our current SLOA instrument (exit exam for graduating seniors) measures the aforementioned topic areas, none of which properly belong to sociolinguistics as a subfield of linguistics.

Graduate Academic and Advisory Committee

Change 1: Allowing anthropology majors to choose ANTH 100X or ANTH 101X as one of their general education requirements We are requesting this change in response to the recent revisions to the General Education requirements. Under the previous system, all students were required to take either ANTH 100X or SOC 100X. The department required that anthropology majors choose to take ANTH 100X. Under the new framework, students can choose from an expanded list of courses to fulfill the Gen Ed Social Sciences requirement. That list includes ANTH 101X: Introduction to Anthropology. Given that this course provides an introduction to all the major subfields within anthropology, it also serves as an appropriate gateway course for later coursework in the field. Because the department was aware that the change to the GER was coming, we have been slowly updating our 200 and 300 level courses to add ANTH 101X as a valid introductory-level prerequisite. Change 2: Replacing ANTH/LING 223 with ANTH/LING 260 We are requesting this change because the current course that was meant to expose students to the subfield of linguistic anthropology is more oriented toward linguistics than anthropology and does not include in its scope the development of linguistic anthropology as a subfield, nor classic concerns that have motivated scholarship in this area. ANTH/LING 260 was added to the catalog last year in anticipation of changing major and minor requirements to better meet SLO.
