COURSE DESCRIPTION:

An exploration into ancient traditions of magic as evidenced by Mesopotamian, Egyptian, Biblical, and Graeco-Roman texts and artifacts, focusing upon their rationales, methods, efficacy, and legitimacy with respect to variously preventing, mitigating, or invoking harmful and destructive forces.

GENERAL DESCRIPTION OF GOALS:

The instructor's goals for this course are, simply, to foster the student learning outcomes and objectives—namely:

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES / OBJECTIVES:

To acquaint the student with representative ancient texts and material artifacts pertaining to the magical arts in the Near Eastern and Mediterranean worlds; to investigate the methods and rationales for invoking magic; to explore the underlying notions of cosmology and causality that animated ancient magic. At the conclusion of this course, the diligent student will be capable of broadly sketching the places and purposes of magic within each of the ancient cultures surveyed (Egyptian, Sumerian, Assyrian, Babylonian, Israelite, Greek, Roman). The student will also be able to reflect critically upon how the magical relates—both historically and contemporarily—to the religious and the scientific.

INSTRUCTIONAL METHODS:

This course will be conducted in a lecture—seminar format, featuring presentations by the instructor designed to involve the students in vibrant discussions about the materials and topics at hand. Visual media will be incorporated (chiefly PowerPoint and illustrative handouts) to provide a more vivid context for reflection and conversation.

COURSE POLICIES:
