A. CHANGE IN DEGREE REQUIREMENTS: (Brief statement of program/degree changes and objectives)

The Alaska Native Studies Department (ANS) merged with the Department of Alaska Native and Rural Development in January 2010. The merged departments are known as the Department of Alaska Native Studies and Rural Development or DANSRD. When DANSRD faculty reviewed the ANS program they found that there was a need for significant revising and updating of the existing program in order to bring it into alignment with the DANSRD mission/goals and to ensure that students have access to a meaningful course of study. The DANSRD mission/goals statement includes making the ANS program accessible via distance learning and changes to the program structure are needed to implement the distant delivery of classes.

To achieve the goal of updating the ANS program, DANSRD has redesigned the ANS core and expanded the existing number of concentration choices from two to four. The old "general" concentration has been replaced with "Alaska Native Forms of Cultural Expression"; the old "language" concentration has been redesigned as "Alaska Native Language." Concentrations focusing on Alaska Native Education and Alaska Native Law, Government and Politics have been added. Also added is the capstone course which provides all majors with an opportunity to synthesize what they have learned. Finally, the minimum number of credits required was changed from 130 to 120. This corrects outdated information and understandings. The original ANS design was based on UAF's 130 credit Interdisciplinary Studies program structure. This modeling is no longer relevant and the proposed changes still allow sufficient elective credits for BA intentions within the 120 credit minimum.

**Note: The name of one ANS core course, ANS 310, has been changed ("The Alaska Native Lands Settlement" changes to "Indigenous Land Settlements") herein. This corresponds with a FORMAT 2A request currently being considered. Also one Rural Development course previously taught as 493/693 is included in the new concentrations here proposed as RD 470/670. This FORMAT 1 change is presently under consideration.

The existing design of the ANS program is outdated and no longer responsive to students' needs. Some of the courses in the existing ANS core were not being offered by the department with sufficient consistency to allow students to graduate within a reasonable time-frame. The "general" concentration was so general that it did not help students develop a strong focus within their studies but rather encouraged them to wander

through their course choices with no particular goal in mind. The old "language" concentration consisted mostly of courses offered by departments other than ANS, which resulted in long term scheduling difficulties. No real course delivery schedule was being followed at the time of the merger with DANSRD, and students pursuing the ANS major had been unable to graduate on time. The changes summarized below correct these problems:

- The new ANS core classes are all offered from within DANSRD, allowing the department to create and follow a consistent schedule from semester to semester. Scheduling of courses will adhere to a three year plan so that all ANS majors will be able to meet program requirements in a timely manner.
- The core classes have been chosen to ensure that all ANS students develop a common foundation of knowledge regardless of which concentration they pursue.
- The inclusion of a capstone requirement encourages students to form connections between the courses they take, and to use those connections to get the most out of their program and to consolidate their knowledge before graduation.
- The concentration areas have been chosen to provide considerable choice for students within the program, all the while retaining the focus needed to realize the DANSRD mission and program interests.
- The core has been increased from 18 to 24 credits. Specific changes include:
 - (a) ANL 315/ANL316 moved to relevant concentration area
 - (b) ANS/PS 325— moved to relevant concentration area and replaced by ANS 310 in core
 - (c) ANS 347 moved to relevant concentration area
 - (d) ANS 401 retained in core
 - (e) ANS/ANTH 242 retained in core
 - (f) HIST 110 or ANS 101 HIST 110 (cross listed with ANS 111) moved to relevant concentration areas, ANS 101 retained in core
 - (g) ANS 350, RD 350, ANS 375, and RD 475 (capstone) added to core
- The minimum credits-to-degree needed has been reduced from 130 to 120. This serves to bring the degree requirements in line with other proposed changes and makes the degree more accessible and attractive to students.

DANSRD faculty meets on a weekly basis and regularly discusses program status and proposed changes. These changes have been agreed upon as the most effective way to enhance the program and provide the best possible value to students.
