. ESTIMATED IMPACT

WHAT IMPACT, IF ANY, WILL THIS HAVE ON BUDGET, FACILITIES/SPACE, FACULTY, ETC.

Most of the courses listed here are already being offered, so the impact will not be tremendous. I know that it looks like there are huge changes, and there are; but faculty workloads remain the same – though some courses will be offered at a different rate. Attached are recommended courses of study for students that will be used during advising sessions. A majority of the courses we are adding/changing are more reflective of the current faculty in the Theatre Department, and in response to student's needs and desires.

Currently, the primary Film faculty member on campus is a Term-Assistant Professor position. While many of the courses are covered by other tenure-track faculty (within and outside the department), we would be missing some critical pieces in a student's development as a Film student if that line were to disappear. We have requested that the current Term position be made into a tenure track position, when in fact we feel students would be best served by two film faculty positions: one with a more technical and documentarian slant, and one with a more dramatic, traditional film school emphasis. Recently (February, 2011) the Film program was passed by the Board of Regents; though it is still awaiting accreditation approval (typically takes 3 months we're told). We will likely revisit the Film (only) program again next year in light of this new information.

Additionally, as the film program grows, there would be additional burden on the College and Department to appropriate fund additional equipment and maintenance for existing equipment.

The Committee asked for documentation from the English/Journalism programs. We will try to get their signatures over the next day or two; but if you look at the Film Program course of study (particularly if you look at the proposed schedule – attached) you will notice that the impacts on those programs are not tremendous. The goal is to increase enrollment in those courses; and most of the courses in those departments (with the exception of Journalism 280 – Digital Video Editing) are only optional courses within a wide pool of courses

The Theatre Department has, for well over a decade, offered these various "tracks" of focus for students to take – emphasizing the major areas of theatre and film entertainment (directing, performance, design/tech, film). We strongly believe this is the best way to develop a strong program; and it has been growing slowly but steadily since we first created the tracks approximately 15 years ago. You may notice that in fact; the same four tracks are currently being offered (again: the changes aren't really that major) – instead this is an update to better reflect our faculty which has changed dramatically in the last 3 years, and to better serve our students.

We have met numerous times with the Journalism, English and Art Departments discussing these changes; primarily in connection with the Film emphasis overhaul.

Our Program Assessment plan would not change much; other than we have expanded the "Portfolio Review" process (at least 4 are required of each Theatre Major) now includes "Reels" for students with a Film emphasis.

In addition to new faculty – with different areas of expertise from the last time we made curriculum revisions, we are continuing to respond to and increased desire from students wanting to concentrate in Film and Acting.

Overall changes:

We are creating a new course, "Collaborative Process" to better prepare our students for the true working environment of the Professional Theatre world. This will be required of all Theatre Majors. We have done away with "Playscript Analysis" and modified our "Dramatic Literature" course to give our students a better foundation and understanding of dramatic structure.

Design changes:

Costume Design and Construction has been split into their respective areas; Costume Design and Costume Construction and Crafts. This is a far more typical way of teaching those courses; but our previous faculty costumer liked to combine the two areas.

Film:

We have created numerous new courses (and are dropping some others) to give the students interested in Film a more rounded education — and to help better prepare them to continue their studies in a Film graduate program if they choose. As an example, lighting and sound design for theatre is quite different than for film; and so we are developing a new course which combines the two areas with a film emphasis...this is in direct response to what we have seen students lacking in their projects.

Our current film faculty is an Anthropologist by trade, and we are adding a course focusing on cross-cultural film production; which fits well with our location, UAF's mission statement, and faculty expertise.

Performance changes:

We are combining "Movement for the Actor" and "Acting Styles" to create a new Acting course; then renumbering those so there is a clear progression for the student to follow (121, 221, 321, 421).
