### A. Update from GERC concerning 'C' requirement.

**This from Leah Berman:** The current scheme under consideration is to have departments be responsible for developing plans for how students in each of their degree programs will address the Communications learning outcomes (which we've developed) without requiring specifically notated courses.

Some obvious questions are

- (1) What would such a plan look like (we're working on some samples)
- (2) Whose responsibility would it be to approve the plans initially
- (3) What accountability would there be later as to whether the plan is (a) working, and (b) being followed.

#### CREDIT FOR NATIONAL EXAMS

There are several ways to earn college credit by receiving a passing score on a national exam. For any of the following exam options, grades are not computed in the UAF GPA. Credit received for exams is not considered UAF residence credit and is not considered to be part of the semester course load for classification as a full-time student. Credit is awarded to current or previously enrolled degree students at UAF. Rules that apply to transfer courses (including the Table of Substitutions) also apply to course credit received through a National Exam.

**[note: these national exams include** College-Level Examination Program (CLEP), College Board Advanced Placement Exams (CEEB), and International Baccalaureate (IB) exams]

### D. Towards a plan to make forward motion regarding changes in UAF's general Education Requirements

(1) 9-person UA committee. UAF Fac Senate Pres agrees to add Newberry to UAF's list if he steps down from Chairing CAC. Brian Cook has agreed to chair CAC spring 2015 if that happens.

(2) This committee makes recommendations to individual CAC-like committees and Faculty Senates concerning 'how many rules should be changed? How should they be changed?'

**(3) Email from GERC Chair to Dean CLA:**

We're working on moving along the GER requirement section of the GERC proposal (which was badly complicated by the BoR!). This is the section that says things like "students need to take two Social Science courses and one Arts course and one Humanities course" (and one other H or A course).

We settled on wanting to populate these categories with 20 - 30 courses each. I was hoping that CLA could take the lead in suggesting what courses would make sense for these categories, by providing an initial list of 20 or so GER Humanities courses, 20 or so GER Social Sciences courses, and 20 or so Arts courses.

(I'm not sure what the best approach would be to determine this; would it be a good project for the CLA Curriculum Council? Would it make sense for each department to propose a couple of courses? Some ad-hoc committee?)

Some constraints: —We'd like the courses to be prerequisite-free and at the 100 and 200 level where possible.

—The hope is that the "decorations" proposed in the Civic Engagement section of the GERC proposal (Alaska and the Circumpolar North, Civic Engagement, Intercultural Competence and Diversity) will eventually be approved, so selecting courses that would naturally be decoratable would be helpful (e.g., in a choice between a course that could have a decoration and one that wouldn't, it would be nice to choose the one that would).

—At the moment, we are operating under the assumption that eventually, the GERC/GELO new descriptions will be passed, so we don't have to worry about the "broad survey" requirement for social sciences, and we are allowing Arts courses to include skills-acquisition, along with theory.

—I'm hoping for a broad spectrum of courses, with probably no more than two or three courses from a single program. We can't include all the courses we might like; the lists will just get overwhelmingly long. (I saw about 10 courses in History that I would like to include, but that's too many from one department).

—we want to choose courses that will be the best for "general education" for the widest number of students.

—Ideally, the categories would be disjoint: courses in the Arts bucket wouldn't also be in the Humanities bucket for the purposes of satisfying the GER.

I know this is a busy time for everyone, but it would be great if I could get a first-pass list by the end of January, and then GERC can discuss additions and revisions (especially adding courses that are outside CLA, e.g., ANS 101).
